SPECIAL DAYS THIS WEEK:

AUGUST 28 - MEMORIAL OF SAINT AUGUSTINE, BISHOP, DOCTOR: Augustine, born in North Africa, abandoned his Christian faith but later embraced it, thanks to the prayers of his mother Monica and the influence of the great Bishop Ambrose whose sermons convinced him of the truth of Christianity. At Easter 387, Augustine was baptized by Ambrose and later was ordained a priest, becoming Bishop of Hippo in 396. Augustine successfully defended the Christian faith against several heresies. His intelligence and pastoral concern shaped the thought of Western Christianity and guided the Church for over a thousand years. Augustine is one of the greatest Fathers of the Church and is known as the Doctor of Grace.

AUGUST 29 - MEMORIAL OF THE PASSION OF SAINT JOHN THE BAPTIST: After John's birth, his father Zechariah spoke Isaiah's prophecy ('Benedictus'), saying that his son John would prepare the way of the Lord. John did just that; he traveled around the countryside, preaching a baptism of repentance for the forgiveness of sins. In his zeal, John reproved Herod for living with his brother's wife, Herodias, so Herod had John imprisoned. When Salome, the daughter of Herodias, impressed Herod with her dancing, Herod promised her whatever she wanted. Salome consulted her mother who told her to ask for the head of John the Baptist on a platter. Herod could not refuse to honour his oath. The news of John's death soon reached his disciples who came for the body and laid it in a tomb.

<u>From A Letter of Saint Ignatius</u>: Only in recent years, since I came to St.Alban's, have I learned of some of the writings of our own dear Saint Ignatius of Antioch. This is an excerpt from a letter to his much younger friend, Saint Polycarp, who was also a bishop.

"I was so happy to see your face. May I ever enjoy the sight of it in eternity. Press forward on your journey, and exhort all men to salvation. Always have great concern for the spiritual and daily needs of your flock. Let unity, the greatest of all good, be your preoccupation. Carry the burdens of all, as the Lord carries yours. Have patience with all in charity, as indeed you do. Give yourself to prayer continually. Ask for wisdom greater than you now have. Speak to each person individually, following Jesus example. Bear the weaknesses of all, like a perfect athlete of God. The greater the toil, the richer the reward. If you love only your good disciples, you gain no merit. Rather, you must win over the more troublesome by kindness. I'm everything, I am your devoted friend-I and my chains, which you have kissed."

Reading the Word at Funeral Masses: At every Mass, the Word of God should be read with the greatest clarity and reverence and dignity. At every Mass, the Word of God should be proclaimed well. At Funeral Masses, the family and the people attending are most attentive to the Word to find comfort and peace at a very difficult time in their lives. I will speak to both funeral directors in our parish, and a list of readers will be provided so that the family of the deceased can choose readers who have had experience and training in reading of the Word of God. This way, the family do not have to choose family members to read the Word of God.

ST. IGNATIUS PARISH ANNOUNCEMENTS AND UPCOMING EVENTS

The Newfoundland Flag: The pink in the Newfoundland flag started as a symbol of the English Protestant in the late 1830's. The pink represented the English Tudor Rose-The Irish Catholic immigrants responded by flying a green flag bearing the Celtic harp. In the 1840's, the division between these two groups continued, with frequent religious strife. In 1843, a delegation of religious leaders went to the Roman Catholic Bishop of St. John's, the Reverend Michael Fleming who was widely respected. After pondering the problem, the bishop took the two flags, the pink and the green, and placed a white hanger chief between them, which he said represented the white of peace from the flag of St. Andrew. The bishop handed the flag, pink, white and green to the group and said "Go in peace". The new native flag became the Newfoundland flag, flown throughout the island. Captain Bob Bartlett planted the pink, white and green flag just a few miles from the North Pole when he accompanied Admiral Perry on his 1909 Polar expedition. The Newfoundland flag gave way to England's Union Jack flag during the 1900's. But the pink, white and green still remained the true flag of Newfoundland in the hearts of many islanders. The flag of the common man, once made from dyed flour sacks, still resonates with Bishop Fleming's blessing "Go in Peace".

A New Walkway: People visiting the Parish Office at the Parish house will see a big improvement in our property. A beautiful brand new walkway. The old concrete path was terribly damaged, and in the winter was difficult to clean of snow and ice. Sometimes ice gathered on the path and made it unsafe. Now we have a new walkway, which will be easier to clean of ice and snow. This beautiful work was done by Gerry Collier, Father Brophy and Danny Farrell. Also, Anthony Willcott and George Davis helped. A great big 'Thank You' to all these men.

Marriage: This is the season of marriage. Many young couples have decided to enter into this beautiful union, to which the angels assent, and the heavenly Father recognizes. Christ himself recognized the dignity and beauty of marriage when he attended a wedding in Cana of Galilee. Her daughter, Candice has several medical conditions including Spina Bifida and Cerebral Palsy. During a hospital stay in St Anthony last November when Candice was very sick, her mother said that a doctor told her that her daughter, who is 25 years old, was dying, and that she had the option to end her life. In the presence of the sick woman the doctor said assisted suicide was legal in Canada. The mother said "I was shocked and I told him I wasn't interested. He told me I was being selfish". One thing that made the mother upset was that the doctor suggested assisted suicide in the presence of her daughter while the young woman was in earshot. God has given life, and life is sacred from before the time of birth, even life in the womb, and God should decide when it is time for us to die as well.

The Shrine of Saint Anne de Beaupre: Possibly the most important shrine in Canada is the Shrine of Saint Anne de Beaupre. In 1658, a labourer, Louis Guimont was suffering from terrible back pain. He came to help with the construction of the first chapel dedicated to Saint Anne. He was immediately and miraculously healed. Some years later in 1665, an Ursuline nun wrote "There is a village here called the 'The Little Cape', where there is a Church dedicated to Saint Anne. Here, Our Lord is working great marvels in favour of the holy mother of the Blessed Virgin Mary. Here, the paralyzed walk, the blind can see, the sick are healed from every kind of illness." Even today, Saint Anne de Beaupre is a place of grace and miracles. Each year, up to one million pilgrims and visitors go there to ask the help of Good Saint Anne.

Cremation in the Catholic Church: Many people are inquiring about cremation in the Church, and some people are choosing to have their body cremated after death. The first thing all must know is that cremation is permitted in the Catholic Church. Some large cities are finding difficulty in obtaining large pieces of ground for new cemeteries and cremation may be a partial solution to this problem. Also, some people die far from home, and the cost of sending home the body in a casket is very expensive compared to sending an urn with a loved ones ashes. Cremation should take place after the funeral Mass. The ashes of the deceased person should be reverently buried or entombed in a place reserved for the burial of the dead. As in life, the body is the temple of the Holy Spirit, so in death the ashes of the deceased person should not be scattered but should be buried in a holy place where we await the resurrection to new life.

The Five Finger Prayer: You may find this prayer helpful. And it is always close to you. All of us could make this five finger prayer a part of our lives.

Your thumb

is nearest you. So begin your prayers by praying for those closest to you. They are the easiest to remember. To pray for our loved ones is, as C. S. Lewis once said, a 'sweet duty.'

The next finger

is the pointing finger. Pray for those who teach, instruct and heal. This includes teachers, doctors, and ministers. They need support and wisdom in pointing others in the right direction. Keep them in your prayers.

The next finger

is the tallest finger. It reminds us of our leaders. Pray for the president, leaders in business and industry, and administrators.. These people shape our nation and guide public opinion. They need God's guidance.

The Fourth Finger

is our ring finger. Surprising to many is the fact that this is our weakest finger, as any piano teacher will testify. It should remind us to pray for those who are weak, in trouble Or in pain. They need your prayers day and night. You cannot pray too much for them.

And lastly comes our little finger

the smallest finger of all which is where we should place ourselves in relation to God and others. As the Bible says "The least shall be the greatest among you." Your pinkie should remind You to pray for yourself. By the time you have prayed for the other four groups, your own needs will put into proper perspective and you will be able to pray for yourself more effectively.
